Professor Alsen demonstrates that the traits which distinguish the fiction of the romantic postmodernists from the fiction of their disjunctive and nihilist colleagues include a vision of life that is a form of philosophical idealism, an organic view of art, modes of storytelling that are reminiscent of the nineteenth-century romance, and such themes as the nature of sin or evil, the negative effects of technology on the soul, and the quest for transcendence.
