Most of the content in the Career Pathways Handbook is based on a series of career profiles - each one packed with four pages of valuable information, including the latest U.S. employment statistics and wage information, career dialogues with "real people" who work in

the occupations, and extensive information for identifying and comparing related occupations. Each profile uses a consistent format to allow for easy reading and useful comparisons between occupations. While this book is based on a foundation of 154 different occupations, it also includes valuable information on several hundred occupations via the career path and related occupations tables. It is important to me that the information in this book will not only be useful to readers, but also be as current and reliable as possible. Therefore I have included the most recent information from reliable Government sources, as well as my own proprietary information from 20 years of extensive occupational research. The Government sources are U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) programs. For example, I have incorporated information from DOL's new O*NET Database, which includes the occupation titles and definitions, common job tasks, key skills and abilities, and related occupations. I

have added the most recent employment statistics and wage information from DOL's Bureau of Labor Statistics. Finally, from our own research, I have added career path and "real people" career dialogue elements, and have enhanced and expanded the DOL information throughout. For example, the O*NET Related Occupations lists were significantly expanded and education/training information, along with growth and wage data, were added to make occupational comparisons more meaningful. The Job Tasks have been expanded to make them more useful. The education and training information is based on DOL's Typical Education Levels, but has also been expanded for this book. I have also written or rewritten many of the job outlook and analysis statements that are incorporated into the Employment Outlook sections. Finally, I have included a number of resource guides to help job seekers and career explorers reach their goals. Beginning on page 617, there are guides on Planning Your Career,

Researching Occupations, Education & Training Options, Looking for a Job, Competing for a Job, Writing a Resume, Writing a Cover Letter, Completing the Application, Preparing for the Interview, and Common Interview Questions. There are countless numbers of books (both good and bad ones) on all of these subjects, so I've included a list of my favorite books on my website under Readers' Resources (see www.cassio.com). Valley 1977 **Concepts and Practices of Career Education in Two Elementary School Districts in Oregon** John Harvard Baker 1974 This study was conducted to discover whether two elementary school districts, one committed to career education and the other not committed, would show a significant difference in their response to 60 statements about career

education and its practice. The study was also designed to determine to what degree students and teachers would differ in their response. Other important objectives were to ascertain whether the integration of academic and vocational education is perceived as a viable career education method of instruction. Additional aims were discerning the characteristics which identify career education generally and career awareness specifically as well as identifying the various methodologies used for career awareness education. A questionnaire, refined by a jury panel of career educators and two field tests, was administered to 140 sixth grade students and 12 sixth grade teachers from each district. Responses were given on a five-point Likert type of scale. The readability level was set at early fifth grade using the Fry graph. Means and standard deviations were computed for each item and the data were analyzed to test three hypotheses: H1 There is no school effect, H2 There is no

personal effect, and H3 There is no interaction effect. The F statistic was the basis for computing the analysis of variance. The critical significance level was set at $[\alpha] = .05$. Five H1 hypotheses were rejected, twenty H2 hypotheses were rejected, and four H3 hypotheses were rejected. The data showed that the career education district teachers were much more in agreement with identified career education concepts and practices than were the teachers in the non-career district. However, little congruity was indicated between all students and all teachers concerning career education concepts and practices, while considerable agreement between students was indicated. Both teacher groups showed less variability of response on their answers than did students. The literature indicated a broad definition for career education. Career awareness is defined with more agreement. Work preparedness was presented by most career education authors as central to the career

education movement. An integration of various school disciplines was seen as an essential teaching method as was the assimilation of career education into all levels of the existing curriculum. In a total school articulation career awareness is presented as the time to become aware of the variety and value of work and the awareness of self within the knowledge of the possibilities in the world of work. It was recommended that this or similar studies be made on the elementary, junior and senior high levels to determine to what extent the findings of this study might be duplicated. The study also points out the need for teacher training institutions to provide more extensive pre- and in-service career education instruction dealing with both the concepts and practices (methodology) of career education.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is the principal federal agency responsible for measuring labor market activity, working conditions, and price changes in the economy. Together, these agencies produce a wealth of information about the American workforce. This book includes information about the jobs that people hold, the occupations that they pursue, the industries where they work, and the education levels that people have attained. In addition to tables, each section also includes relevant figures and highlights of notable data. Some examples of interesting data found inside Education and the American Workforce include: With no formal educational requirement and a median salary of \$22,680, 4.5 million people are employed as retail salespersons, the most of any single occupation. Cashiers and food preparation/serving workers account for another 3.5 million each. There are 2.9 million registered

nurses, the most numerous of occupations that require a bachelor's degree. The biggest numeric decline is expected for Postal Service mail carriers, dropping by about 78,000 in ten years. When combined with other Postal Service occupations—such as clerks, sorters, postmasters, and others—a decline of 140,000 jobs is expected for the Postal Service. Among the 75 largest counties, Bronx County, NY had the highest number of residents age 25 and over with less than a high school diploma at 29.4 percent while Montgomery County, PA had the lowest percentage at 6.2 percent. Meanwhile, New York County, NY and Fairfax County, VA had the highest percentage of residents with a bachelor's degree or higher at 59.9 percent followed by Montgomery County, MD at 57.9 percent among the 75 largest counties. Nationally, between 2011 and 2015, 29.8 percent of the population had a bachelor's degree or higher.

To meet these needs, the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) in 1998 launched the Occupational Information Network (O*NET), which consists of a content model—a framework for organizing occupational data—and an electronic database. The O*NET content model includes hundreds of descriptors of work and workers organized into domains, such as skills, knowledge, and work activities. Data are collected using a classification system that organizes job titles into 1,102 occupations. The National Center for O*NET Development (the O*NET Center) continually collects data related to these occupations. In 2008, DOL requested the National Academies to review O*NET and consider its future directions. In response, the
