(1865-1910) was a German novelist, poet, journalist and editor. His 1897 novel *Stilpe* inspired the first cabaret venue in Berlin a few years later; his last novel, the 1909 *Yankeedoodlefahrt*, produced a German proverb still in use today: "Humor is when you laugh anyway."
